There are very few people who say that winter is their favorite season. Most people say their favorite season is either spring or summer or even autumn. There is a parallel between the seasons and the progression of

Yet others enjoy the evening and look forward to that part of each day most of all. However, night can be a trial for some people. Most everyone suffers from occasional bouts of insomnia. Under such circumstances, night seems interminable and the arrival of dawn a most welcome relief.

As we observe this year's Passover and Feast of Unleavened Bread let us do so with heightened joy, zeal and appreciation.

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Peace and Unity in the Church

In my early years in the church, it never occurred to me that there would be divisions and splits in the church as I witnessed the unity and peace among the brethren and their families. But it happened, and many members were caught off guard and unprepared for the situation. Many were shocked, hurt and had life shattered as brethren broke apart – even within families.

History shows that divisions and conflict are challenges that have existed in every organization. Peace and unity are contrary to

Behaviours that threaten peace and unity

Paul identified brethren comparing themselves with each other as one cause of division. When believers classed or grouped themselves and claimed, "I am of Paul", "I am of Apollos" or "I am Cephas" (1 Corinthians 1:12), Paul called it a carnal attitude. He stated that Christians should follow God and not any human leader.

Paul warns, "For we dare not class ourselves or compare our-

human nature. That is why in the Bible we are instructed to endeavour – that means to work hard, to strive or make effort – for unity and peace.

The Bible gives us principles that will help us to prevent or minimize, if not totally eradicate, the occurrence of divisions. The principles are applicable for all seasons, all ages, and in all occasions. They are applicable to bring peace not only in the church but even at home, work, and everywhere we go.

These principles can be grouped into three categories: avoiding behaviors that threaten peace and unity; avoiding behaviours that are enemies to peace and unity; and pursuing behaviours that maintain peace and unity.

selves with those who commend themselves. But they, measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise" (2 Corinthians 10:12).

Commending one's self (that is to praise, to acclaim or extol oneself above another) will threaten the peace and unity in a relationship. Paul mentioned that he himself will not boast beyond measure and he advised the members that they should not look for man's praise but rather praise from God, "Not he who commends himself is approved, but whom the Lord commends" (2 Corinthians 10:18).

Paul further admonishes us to do things not through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind esteeming others better than ourselves.

Today we see people being mistreated because of their appearance or social standing. This attitude is described by James as being a respecter of persons or partial. That means judging by appearance, which is contrary to Christ's instruction.

God is calling people from all walks of life and we need to welcome them. I remember Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong saying that every human being is a potential child of God in His Kingdom.

James instructed, "My brethren, do not hold the faith of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory, with partiality. For if there should come into your assembly a man with gold rings, in fine apparel, and there should also come in a poor man in filthy clothes, and you pay attention to the one wearing the fine clothes and say to him, 'You sit here in a good place,' and say to the poor man, 'You stand there,' or, 'Sit here at my footstool,' have you not shown partiality among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts?" (James 2:1-4).

Comparing people leads to judging. Paul's admonition was to not judge as each of us shall give account of himself to God. "Therefore let us not judge one another anymore, but rather resolve this, not to put a stumbling block or a cause to fall in our brother's way" (Romans 14:13).

Jesus instructed that a person should examine himself before



judging others. As Jesus mentioned, "He who is without sin among you let him cast the first stone at her" (John 8:7). If people will examine themselves first, then they will be less judgmental and will be more merciful in recognizing the human struggles in this life.

Behaviours that are enemies of peace and unity

Gossiping is defined as idle talk, not always truthful, about people and their affairs. It is repeating what one knows, or idle talk that one hears, about people and their affairs.

James, in his time, concluded that the tongue was the main culprit for gossip (James 3:6). Today people can communicate and gossip through the use of different media

(e.g. text, photo messaging, internet use, use of electronic social forum, chat and more). The problem goes beyond the control of the tongue to the control of mind, attitude or character.

Gossip through technology can spread in hours if not minutes. This is dangerous and has wrecked many lives and split best friends and families – even in the church.

False doctrine and false teaching are the most dangerous. That is why the instruction was to not only avoid false doctrine or teaching but to also avoid the person carrying it. "Now I urge you, brethren, note those who cause divisions and offenses, contrary to the doctrine which you learned, and avoid them" (Romans16:17-18).

In addition, Paul had a strong in-

struction given to Timothy, "... that may charge that they some teach no other doctrine, nor give heed to fables and endgenealogies, less which cause disputes rather than edification godly which is in faith" (1 Timothy 1:3-4).

Today we are living in perilous time, not only physically but also mentally and spiritually. There are so many teachings around us within our reach at

any time and at any place through modern technology. There is information that causes confusion and lead many astray even in the church. We must be careful of what we get and read through modern technologies available this time.

Behaviours that maintain peace and unity

Just like any relationship, unity and peace, needs to be nurtured and nourished to flourish. The following are things that will help us encourage and strengthen it in the church.

Forgiveness has a reconciling and healing effect on people. God knows that, while living on this earth, it is difficult for anyone to not be offended or offend others by actions or words in or outside the church.

Jesus knew human nature and told Peter that we should forgive seventy times seven. In other words, God wanted Christians to have a forgiving attitude like Him.

In the parable of the prodigal son, the message for God's people is that, like the Father, we also should have a forgiving attitude.

Christians are called to be a light to the world so that the world may see our good works and glorify our Father in heaven. Christians should be a source of good works and good words.

Christians are instructed to be hospitable without grumbling. Jesus stated this is the sign of His



people, "if you have love for one another" (John 13:35).

Christians are called to, "having your conduct honorable among the Gentiles, that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may, by your good works which they observe, glorify God in the day of visitation" (1Peter 2:12).

Paul's admonition was "not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as you see the Day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25). The church provides services, good works activities and social events for church members and their families to be involved in.

As the saying goes, the family that eats together, plays together and prays together stays together. Brethren should spend time together: to help and encourage one another and to strengthen the camaraderie or relationship of the brethren in the church.

All indications show that unity and peace are contrary to human nature. The adversary detests peace and unity. His desire is to divide God's people so that they may be easy prey to conquer. We need to pray for one another as Paul stated, "For this reason we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to ask that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding; that you may walk worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing Him, being fruitful in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Colossians 1:9-10).

God will call many new and former members into the church. The challenge is to maintain peace and unity in the body. God provided the principles as described above that each of us need to apply to attain the desired peace and unity in the church.

Paul acknowledged our human tendency to compare ourselves and gave this analogy that will help the people understand the differences in each other, "For as the body is one and has many members, but all the members of that one body, being many, are one body, so also is Christ" (1 Corinthians 12:12). It is God who sets the members, each one of them, in the body just as He pleases.

The following are not leavening agents: brewer's yeast, yeast extract (a flavoring), corn starch and cream of tartar. Cream of tartar acts as a neutralizer when used with baking soda but does not, by itself, cause dough to rise and thus is not a leavening agent.

First Video Conference for National Council

On December 3, the National Council had its first meeting using Web-Ex technology. This allowed Council members to see and hear each other, which is more effective and more economical than having a teleconference.

Minutes from the preceding meeting were reviewed and adopted making them official.

The office update by Anthony Wasilkoff and Edwin van Pelt showed positive indicators for God's work here in Canada. A recent Subscriber Development Letter has received good responses and added some new donors. Our subscription list is growing slowly, but we continue to remove those not wishing to receive *The Good News* magazine. This past year our *Bonnes Nouvelles* subscription list has increased, which is most encouraging.

Five office staff members attended an all day Church and Charity Law Seminar on November 15. A summary of the seminar was sent to Council. This summary indicated several additional policies the church needs to create.

Michael Erickson gave an update on behalf of the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act Compliancy Task Force. Council input was requested on several items. One concern that must be resolved is the potential confusion between a "member of the corporation" and a "member of the church". A member of the corporation is someone who is a member of the National Conference, which is composed of all of our elders in Canada plus the two laymembers on the National Council. While the Church is a spiritual body, for legal purposes, a member of the church is someone whose baptism has been conducted by or recognized by the church and has filled out a membership form. The Council was presented with two scenarios on how this might be resolved. They chose to more carefully define the terms. The Council also made decisions on two additional technicalities. The Task Force has almost completed its job and is appreciative of the input and help given by the Amendment Committee members.

Both the Operations Plan and Budget for the 2013-2014 fiscal year were presented and approved to be sent to the National Conference for ratification. The Council also approved sending a Resolution to the National Conference for their ratification. This resolution seeks to change the previously set date for the annual meeting of the National Conference from

March to June this year. This is to conform to new government rules.

If the Resolution is passed by the National Conference, the Strategic Plan, Operations Plan and Budget will still be sent to the National Conference to be approved prior to the fiscal year end. All other business will be done during the June meeting.

The final business matter was to schedule the next Council meeting for March 11. Plans for the June 2013 meetings are for the Media Team and Ministerial Services Team to meet on Wednesday, June 19. Council meetings will be on June 20 and June 21. There will be a Ministers' Conference on Saturday night and Sunday afternoon. The annual meeting of the National Conference will be on Sunday morning and early afternoon, June 23.

Since the National Conference will be asked to approve the Bylaws that have been amended to meet new federal government standards, Michael Erickson suggested scheduling a WebEx conference call prior to the annual meeting for those who might have questions about any of the changes to the Bylaws.

I experienced the joy, warm friendships, enlightened teaching, sports and exquisite arts reminiscent of the Feast of Tabernacles and a foretaste of what we hope for in the Kingdom of God.

This year, I made the journey with my brother and two friends. We arrived at the Great Wolf Lodge, a massive timber and wood-themed waterpark and hotel. It was a joy to see familiar faces from the feast and other occasions.

Friday evening a Bible study, on how to build lasting friendships, was conducted by Frank Dunkle. He used a Star Wars anecdote as he expounded the biblical friendship of David and Jonathan. He covered Proverbs about friendships such as "The sweetness of a man's friend gives delight by hearty counsel", and "As iron sharpens iron, so a man sharpens the countenance of his friend". We learned practical, biblical ways to be a better friend.

The Bible study transitioned perfectly into the desert social - a memorable occasion for more reasons than chocolate cake! At every turn and with every situation, there was a new opportunity to make a new friend or acquaintance.

Sabbath was full of unparalled learning opportunities, friends

and joy. There were many talented speakers and presenters in one place. They had put much time and effort into well-produced and captivating seminars, sermons and Bible studies with many targeted to specific audiences, such as teens, young adults, adults and leaders. Sabbath morning, I attended two seminars—both insightful and astutely delivered.

Jelly, the puppet featured in short films produced by church members, made a live appearance and introduced a new short film "Jelly Learns the Books of the Bible." For those over 18, the feature of the evening was the adult dance. The theme was "A Night in Arabia" and had all the associated colourful decorations. There were new and familiar tunes for dancing to fast, slow and swing music. More importantly, the warmth and conversation of new and old friends made the night marvelous.

New at the WFW were visual and performing arts. The concourse outside the auditorium was adorned with magnificent paintings, sculptures, pottery, books and other art forms. fore him in private, thus breaking both Roman and Jewish law.

The story of how Jesus cleared the temple of the money changers is well known. What is not so well known is that it was Annas who allowed the money changers into the temple. When Jesus threw them out, Annas was not only embarrassed, he also lost money.

The third unlawful act was regarding the Sanhedrin. Ecclesiastical law prohibited any member of the Sanhedrin from sitting in judgment of any accused if they had any personal dealings with the individual that might cause them to be impartial. Exact language of the Sanhedrin code reads, "Nor under any circumstances is a man known to be at enmity with the accused person permitted to occupy a position among the judges." This law was to protect an accused from being tried before judges who were his enemies. According to that law, several members of the Sanhedrin should have been disqualified.

Total membership in the Sanhedrin was 71 but on the night they tried Jesus they purposely selected a bare quorum of 23. Almost all were related to Annas – five were sons, one was a son-in-law and others were said to be cousins.

The fourth law broken was related to the Passover. Their law prohibited the Sanhedrin from meeting during the Passover, but they ignored that prohibition.

The fifth error was that no one had actually charged Jesus with anything. Suddenly after about 30 minutes of a mock trial, Caiaphas, the High Priest, pronounced Him guilty as charged but, at this point, He had not been charged with anything.

The sixth error involved witnesses. Mosaic Law states, "At the mouth of two witnesses, or three witnesses, shall he that is worthy of death be put to death, but at the mouth of one witness he shall not be put to death." They could not find even one true witness, so they willfully broke the ninth commandment, "Thou shalt not bear false witness" and found an individual willing to do just that.

The seventh error is related to jurisdiction. The Sanhedrin had no jurisdiction in the case against Jesus. Until a prisoner had been lawfully arrested and charged, they had no jurisdiction to make judgment. Jesus had not been legally charged. There was no warrant for His arrest. They had simply snuck out at night, captured Him and then took Him before an unlawful 23 member court.

The eighth error was their inability to prove His guilt. He said He was the Son of God. It was up to them, as before any court and crown council even today, to prove that He was lying about who He said He was. They could not do that so they simply accused Him of blasphemy.

There were several other infractions of law including failing to allow Christ to introduce witnesses of His own – which He would not have done, but they didn't know

that! Another law that was ignored was regarding an individual's confession. If it was the only evidence, the court was then prohibited from issuing a death sentence. Furthermore, according to their own law, "A criminal case, where a death sentence is to be pronounced can not be concluded before the following day." They simply ignored that too.

Another glaring disregard of law was the decision to take Jesus before Herod. King Herod had absolutely no jurisdiction in the matter. This explains why Herod, knowing full well he could not do anything to either condemn or release Jesus, sent Him to Pontius Pilate.

Since neither the Sanhedrin under the High Priest Caiaphas nor King Herod had any jurisdiction in sentencing Jesus to death, it was unlawful for them to present Him before Pilate – the only one who had authority to order a criminal put to death. Although Jesus was of course accused of a crime, He was never actually charged.

Pilate the Roman governor of Judea broke Roman law when, after finding Jesus guilty of doing nothing wrong (not once but four times), instead of making a decision, which only he could have made, turned Jesus over to the mob to be crucified.

What happened to Jesus of Nazareth was highly illegal under the law of His day. Yet while we can look back at those religious leaders, the Roman civil authorities and the mob that screamed "Cru-

cify Him," the Bible makes it clear that it is the collective sin of all humanity that brought Christ to the stake.

In the book of Isaiah, we read this prophetic statement. "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he hath borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows: yet we did esteem him stricken, smitten of God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity (lawlessness) of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth: he is brought as a lamb to the slaughter . . ." (Isaiah 53:3-7 KJV).

Jesus Christ died a horrifying death in the most cruel and inhu-

mane way known to the world at that time. His trial was illegal and His death was murder. Yet it was according to predetermined divine purpose. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved" (John 3:16-17).

Lose Some Battles, But Win the War

I was born in Sheffield, England, in 1941 during the time German bombs were being dropped on the industrial cities of England – including Sheffield. Germany had already bombed its way through Western Europe. When Poland was invaded, England declared war against Hitler's Nazi army. Poland was quickly defeated and then France succumbed to the German onslaught. England was next and the battle of Britain began.

I vaguely remember the sirens being sounded and families rushing to the air-raid shelter, one of which had been dug in our backyard. In London, people flocked to the subway stations where they could find shelter from the cascading bombs that were falling on that city.

As I grew older, I read a lot about the Second World War. At one point, it seemed inevitable that the Germans would be victorious. However, in spite of the British and Allied forces losing many battles, they still won the war. This historical fact became a valuable life lesson for me when I became a Christian.

The Bible records the history of many battles and emphasizes that Christians are in a spiritual war (Ephesians 6:11-13).

All Christians do lose spiritual battles and this can lead to discouragement, depression and despair. So how do we confront these battles? How can we win the war?

There are three important strategies that we can employ to help us in this conflict.

Set our mind

Just like we set an alarm clock, we must set our mind with scriptures each day. Colossians 3:1-3 instructs us to "set our affections on things above, not on things on the earth."

Jesus employed this principle when he quoted scriptures against Satan in the battle in the wilderness (Matthew 4). He did the same when He responded to the accusations of the Pharisees by stating that they "did not know the scriptures" (Matthew 22:15-23). The book of Proverbs also reminds us that "as we think in our hearts so we will act." The same book also warns us to "guard our heart, for out of it are the issues of life" (Proverbs 4:23).


Bible study is an important spiritual discipline, and Jesus set the example of quoting scriptures when preaching about the issues of life. Scriptures deal with life issues and, by setting our mind on them, they will be a source of great encouragement for us.

Renew our mind

Romans 12:2 states that we should "not be conformed to this world but that we should be transformed by the renewing of our mind, that we may prove what is that good, acceptable and perfect will of God."

David spent a lot of time meditating (Psalm 77:11-12) and it was through this practice that he regularly renewed his mind. We also should exercise this discipline of renewing our mind by reflecting on how

well we have set our mind on things above. By doing this we should be able to make changes in our thinking and then make the necessary adjustments in our actions.



Many people spend a lot of time on physical activity to keep fit. How much more important is it that we meditate and renew our minds to avoid spiritual atrophy?

Gird up the loins of our mind

The apostle Peter uses this phrase in 1 Peter 1:13-16. Peter was probably familiar with the Greco-Roman wrestling culture where he understood that to "gird up" means to bind about.

The apostle Paul also uses this wrestling analogy when he writes, "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against the principalities, powers, rulers of darkness, and against spiritual wick-

edness in high places" (Ephesians 6:11).

How do these three strategies affect our Christian life? The human mind is a wonderful component of God's creation and gives us the capacity of memory, conscience and imagination. Satan wants to distort and cloud our thinking processes. He wants us to have er-

ror, worry, fear and anxiety. This is why we must discipline our minds against these negative trends.

We must regularly set, renew, and gird up our minds and do each prayerfully (1 Thessalonians 5:17).

In life we will lose battles and sometimes become discouraged, Losing battles can lead to depression and despair, so we do need a spiritual battle plan. There are many scriptures of encouragement. One of my favorites is when the apostle Paul writes that with the help of Christ "we are more than conquerors" (Romans 8:37).

Stay in the battle – and win the war.



The Illegal Trial of Jesus Christ

"After two thousand years a brilliant lawyer proves that Jesus of Nazareth was tried and condemned to death for treason and blasphemy in direct and specific violation of the laws of His own time, both religious and civil" (Charter Book publishers-New York).

This article reviews the writings of lawyer, Earle L. Wingo, attorney for the defense of Jesus Christ, with excerpts from his book, *The Illegal Trial of Jesus*.


Few will dispute that a man named Jesus lived 2000 years ago and that He was a great teacher who impacted the world from His time onward. But the world, in general, sees Him as a controversial figure. After all, He made an incredible claim – that He was the very Son of God, the long-prophesied Messiah!

The religious authorities in Jerusalem rejected and eventually succeeded in having Him put to death. The local Roman civil authorities saw Him as a threat and became complicit in His execution. The religions of His day, both Judaism and paganism, opposed the growth of His teachings and used unlawful and violent means to destroy those who became the Church He said he would build. The government of Rome vigorously persecuted the followers of this Jewish teacher from Galilee.

Amazingly, prophecies written long before His birth predicted that Jesus Christ would be rejected not only by His own people, but also by the world in general. In fact, Jesus Himself referred to this prophecy when He told His followers, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: The stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. This was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes" (Matthew 21:42 NKJ). The Apostle Peter repeated it: "This is the 'stone which was rejected by you builders, which has become the chief cornerstone. Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:11-12 NKJ).

Just how was the trial of Jesus Christ illegal?

Filled with jealousy and hatred, both the local religious hierarchy and the civil Roman government of Judea wanted to get rid of a man they perceived as a threat to their



authority. As a result they were willing to break even their own laws. In fact, 18 specific laws related to both their religious code and civil law were violated.

The author explains that the first unlawful act was the apprehension of Jesus by a multitude led by Judas Iscariot, the betrayer who stood by while the soldiers "captured" Jesus. Under the law it was mandatory to inform the person being arrested what the charges were. In Jesus case, they did not charge Him with anything at that point – this was illegal.

The second unlawful act was when they bound Jesus and brought Him before Annas, father-in-law of Caiaphas and his college in the high priesthood known as the Sanhedrin. "The Sanhedrin had the power of life and death in their own hands in every thing that concerned religion; but since they did not have evidence to put Christ to death because of false doctrine, they gave credibility to their conduct by bringing in the civil power. The Jewish right to try capital cases was taken from them some forty years prior to the destruction of Jerusalem, which would mean it was approximately at the time of Jesus' trial that the enactment of the Roman order prohibiting the Jewish court from trying such cases was effected" (Adam Clarke's New Testament Commentary).

"Then Pilate said to them, 'You take Him and judge Him according to your law.' Therefore the Jews said to him, 'It is not lawful for us to put anyone to death" (John 18:31 NKJ).

So in effect Annas had no jurisdiction over Christ. The law prohibited taking a prisoner before any one individual, even a judge, for private examination. Annas went ahead and ordered Jesus be-
